How To Make a TURTLE

You will need:

- 2 brown pipe-cleaners
- 2 green pipe-cleaners
- 2 small googly eyes
- Pva glue
- Scissors

(Please have parental supervision while creating your turtle!)



First, take the two brown pipe-cleaners and curl them both into spirals.



Next, cut one green pipe-cleaner into four pieces (4cm) for the legs and cut another piece (7cm) for the head.





Start to bend and place everything together to get an idea of where to put your pieces. Finally, glue your turtle together.

How To Make French onion Tart

You will need:

- 175g of grated cheese
- 4 onions
- 2 tablespoons of brown sugar
- Pack of prerolled puff pastry
- 2 tblsp white wine vinegar
- Milk



Step 1. Fry the onions with the brown sugar and the white wine vinegar for 10 to 15 minutes until soft.

Step 2. Unroll the puff pastry on a baking tray. Use a rolling pin so that it is the same rectangle shape as the baking tray.



Step 3. Prick the pastry with a fork. Sprinkle some cheese. Leave a border of 5cm around the edge.



Step 4. Spread on the cooled onion.

Step 5. Fold the pastry back inside to create a 2 cm raised border.

Step 6. Brush the edges/border with milk.

Step 7. Bake for 25 minutes in the oven at 180c.

United Kingdom


Gangster Granny
