

- Its climate is mostly temperate with the exception of the Southern Coast of Crimea which has a subtropical Mediterranean climate.
- Its major mountain ranges are the Carpathian and the Crimean.

- Ukraine is among the most educated nations in the world! More than 99% of all adults can read and write.
- Its' major rivers are the Dnieper River and the Dniester.
- In 2019 Ukraine ranked number 51 in the world in terms of total export value, but it is truly a world leader in terms of agricultural exports. Ukraine produces 18% of the world's sunflower seed, safflower or cottonseed oil exports; 13% of corn production; 12% of global barley exports; and 8% of wheat and meslin.


Me and my brother thoroughly enjoyed the movie and would definitely recommend it. By Taran
